The lodge held its annual scholarship awards banquet. The \$2,000 scholarships were presented to five graduating seniors. Over 50 people attended the banquet.



Ye Olde Editor's Ramblings

Ahh! The birds are singing, the dandelions are proliferating, and allergy season is upon us once more! (Ye Olde Editor's "field of dreams" are standing in said field without sneezing his head off.) But we digress.

Once more into the breach, we received from Illustrious Sir, Brother Gerald Edgar, some further light in Masonry – or at least Masonic history. This month, we get to know a famous (not just in this state) and the second oldest (by just several months) member of the US Senate, Brother and 32 ° Scottish Rite Mason, Senator4 Charles (Chuck) Grassley. So, without further ado:

Did U Know (authored weekly by a wonderful Brother in Camden OH.) Charles Ernest Grassley (born September 17, 1933) is an American politician serving as the president pro tempore emeritus of the United States Senate, and the senior United States senator from Iowa, having held the seat since 1981. In 2022, he was re-elected to his eighth Senate term, having first been elected in 1980. He is the longest serving Republican in U.S. Senate history, having overtaken Orrin Hatch's record in January 2023. He is also the sixth longest serving U.S. senator in history. A member of the Republican Party, Grassley served eight terms in the Iowa House of Representatives (1959–1975) and three terms in the United States House of Representatives (1975–1981). He has served three stints as Senate Finance Committee chairman during periods of Republican Senate majority. When Orrin Hatch's Senate term ended on January 3, 2019 following his retirement, Grassley became the most senior Republican in the Senate and its president pro tempore. Upon Patrick Leahy's retirement in January 2023, he became the most senior member of the Senate.

During his four decades in the Senate, Grassley has chaired the Senate Finance Committee, the Senate Narcotics Committee, the Senate Judiciary Committee, and the Senate Aging Committee.

Grassley was born in New Hartford, Iowa, the son of Ruth (née Corwin) and Louis Arthur Grassley, and raised on a farm. He graduated from the town high school. At Iowa State Teachers College (now the University of Northern Iowa), he earned a Bachelor of Arts in 1955 and a Master of Arts in political science in 1956. During his time as a student, Grassley joined the social professional Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity. He pursued a Ph.D. in political science at the University of Iowa, but ultimately did not complete the degree. During the 1950's, Grassley farmed and worked in factories (John Deere) in Iowa, first as a sheet metal shearer and then as an assembly line worker. From 1967 to 1968, he taught at Charles City College. Grassley represented parts of Butler County in the Iowa House of Representatives from 1959 to 1975. He then served in the United States House of Representatives from 1975 to 1981. The author of the Whistleblower Protection Act of 1989, Grassley has campaigned to increase protection and provide support for "whistleblowers". He has supported a number of FBI whistleblowers, including Coleen Rowley, Sibel Edmonds and Jane Turner, although not supporting Department of Defense whistleblower Noel Koch. Grassley received a lifetime achievement award on May 17, 2007 from the National Whistleblower Center. In April 2014, Grassley announced plans to create a caucus in the Senate dedicated to strengthening whistleblower protections.

Grassley and Barbara Ann Speicher married on August 22, 1954. They have five children: Lee, Wendy, Robin, Michele, and Jay. Grassley is a member of the Family, the organization that organizes the National Prayer Breakfast. His grandson, Pat Grassley, is a member of the Iowa House of Representatives. Grassley is also known for his widely reported, long-running "feud" with the History channel; he has consistently accused the network of featuring little actual history programming. According to OpenSecrets, Grassley's net worth was more than \$7.5 million as of 2018.

In 2003, Grassley's alma mater, the University of Northern Iowa, selected him for *honor is causa* membership in Omicron Delta Kappa, the National Leadership Honor Society. In 2009, the National Center for Health Research gave Grassley the Health Policy Hero award for his 2004 oversight of legislative reforms and accountability of the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In 2010, The Hill named Grassley and Max Baucus the hardest working members of Congress.

W. Bro. Edgar also said: "He has never lost an election and is famous nationally for doing the 'full Grassley', i.e. visiting all 99 Iowa counties, every year!" Charles Ernest Grassley became a Mason at the lodge in New Hartford, Iowa which later consolidated with Black Hawk #65 in Cedar Falls, Iowa. He's also a member of the Scottish Rite and recipient of the Honorary De Molay Legion of Honor.
